### 'World's largest' renewable energy storage project proposed for Utah



A newly introduced renewable energy megaproject combining multiple storage technologies is being billed as the world's largest, and it looks to make its home in central Utah. The Advanced Clean Energy Storage (ACES) project will house 1,000 megawatts of energy storage capacity, enough to power 150,000 households for a year.

A joint initiative between Mitsubishi Hitachi Power Systems (MHPS) and Magnum Development, the ACES project will use four different storage technologies: renewable hydrogen, compressed air energy storage, large scale flow batteries, and solid oxide fuel cells.
